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1. Exhibitions:


a) Graham Lewington invites artists to an Open Call at the 'Showing Space' gallery in Silver street, Lincoln. The theme of the open exhibition concerns the situation in Gaza, and will take place some time in November. b) Dave Kenyon (aka photographer "Hobden") has a new exhibition of photos in the Lincoln Central Library. The show opens on Tuesday 8th and closes Friday 18th of October. (The library is closed on Sundays!)

The show is titled "An Other Street Photography" and consists of some 100 semi-abstract colour photographs, half of them framed and hung as A4, half presented on an A2 video screen. The shots are of the actual street/pavement surface and attempt to make engaging compositions from side-lit surfaces after recent rain has intensified colour, and winter sunlight provides strong modelling. All shots were taken in one day 'Uphill' in Lincoln.

The show's title plays on the current popularity of "Street Photography" (actually, mostly of PEOPLE in street settings) and my previous two Autumn exhibitions that have featured Lincoln streets (although not in a "Street Photography" mode).










2. Art Talks:

a) Sept 24th Art Talk - 'Geometry in Art and Ornament' by Kevin Byron. There's still a few spaces available for this next Art Talk starting 7.00pm at St Nicholas Church Hall, Newport, Lincoln LN1 3DP and reservations can be made here: https://www.open-art-lincs.com/art-talks A synopsis of the talk is given below and in the attached flyer.



Geometric (as distinct from organic) form and pattern was the earliest expression of abstraction in art and ornament. Its former symbolic function was similar to that of storytelling in providing a sense of order and meaning in an unpredictable, chaotic world. Starting with the emergence of art in pre-historic times, this talk will explore the evolution and application of geometry in art and ornament in different cultures, and also discuss geometry in modern abstract art. The talk will include demonstrations of simple Celtic and Arabic geometrical construction and the use of geometric design as a codified language.

b) Oct 29th Art Talk - 'Take One a Day' by Paul Gutherson and Jason Baron.



The 1st Lincolnshire Virtual Open Exhibition – on-going call for submissions: A few more artists have recently submitted work and the exhibition has received over 50 hits in the last thirty days with 5 from the USA and one from the Netherlands. 5. Goodbye to Art News!

Thanks once more to everyone who has contributed to Art News over the last eighteen months. The wide variety of news received has amply demonstrated the huge wealth of talent across the whole county and indeed the wider interest in art. Talent however needs opportunities for growth, especially for most artists who, by necessity, are often working full time in another capacity to make ends meet.

Growth of course only appears when creative forces, overcome resisitive ones. These forces appear both within the individual, but also externally in terms of the opportunities provided by the public, private and third sectors. Creative forces in this case refer to equal opportunities for funding, for exhibiting and for participation in conversations, fresh thinking and new ideas. During my few years of involvement in the art world in the city of Lincoln, I've witnessed both these polarities at play and would cite Indigo Crow as the most recent example of a positive creative force for artists.

Looking more generally, if one were diagnose the health of fine art in a city by the range and quality of activity in its public gallery, Lincoln would not do so well in the league tables with its part-time opening and relatively few exhibitions. On the other hand, if we were to use other measures such as the number of independent galleries (eg the recently opened Rickyard gallery), and volunteer projects (eg Creative Lincs and art in the John Dawber gardens), then things look a lot brighter.

OPen Art Lincs and Art News had as its aim to help facilitate the aforementioned creative current. This is by involving as many artists as could be reached, in discussions about art, in sharing stories and successes, and through promoting exhibitions, workshops and talks. Judging by the variety of content received over the months and the feedback obtained from a number of readers, some success was gained in this respect.

As any artist or creative person knows, projects have a lifecycle that ideally start off in an organic way growing rapidly and spreading widely. Hopefully it ends when that phase is over, but that is often not the case. After a time there follows a slower growing phase where creativity begins to be traded-off with routine. Finally maturity is reached as the newness and freshness in the work is attenuated further, and the work becomes largely mechanical. This is the time to stop, to re-think and to begin restoring the creativity by looking in other directions.

Whilst this is not by any means an account of the content and quality of the news received each month from the readership, which was always of a high standard, it is more a reflection of my involvement with it in the production of Art News, coupled to a desire to explore other avenues. So with the issue of this final edition of Art News, I wish you well in your future art creations and in your appreciation of the art of others.
